The petite bourgeoisie is economically distinct from the proletariat and the lumpenproletariat social-class strata who rely entirely on the sale of their labor-power for survival; and also are distinct from the capitalist class haute bourgeoisie ("high bourgeoisie") who own the means of production and thus can buy the labor-power of the proletariat and lumpenproletariat to work the means of production.
